

### PAPUA NEW GUINEA "CANNIBALISM"

In mid 2012, articles about cannibalism in PNG appeared in numerous news articles from around the world. Some estimate that there are 1000 or more Papuans who even today still consume human flesh. interesting aspect of this type of cannibalism is that the victims were "sorcerers or witches" who demanded money from villagers in return for ridding them of bad spells. The villagers became fed up with this and after killing the extortionists, certain parts of their bodies believing that this in turn would give them supernatural powers that could make them bulletproof.

In February 2013, news articles reported a suspected witch being doused with gasoline and burned to death while hundreds of

During my visit, the only major hotel in Port Moresby PNG warned guests with a sign stating:

DO NOT OPEN YOUR HOTEL ROOM DOOR TO ANYONE, INCLUDING STAFF, AFTER 11 PM AND BEFORE 6 AM.



After entering the above village I was surrounded by a group of male villagers who squeezed and touched me from head to toe. Aware of some of their possible dietary deviations and the remoteness of the location, I simply tried not to look edible.



#### **GANG RECRUITMENT IN EL SALVADOR**

Gangs in El Salvador are aggressively recruiting new member using coercion, threats and related forms of intimidation, including the killing of students who refuse to join them. An April 2011 article in a Salvadorian newspaper reported murder of 19 students for refusing to join gangs and the problem that some teachers are themselves gang members and sport tattoos to that effect. Once someone is forced to join, they are compelled to engage in low level criminal offenses. As these offenses escalate and become more serious, the member soon crosses the "threshold" to criminality and then becomes unable to migrate back into the mainstream of society. Expansion efforts of gangs include the infiltration of public security agencies.

#### **GANGS IN EL SALVADOR...**

Today gangs are also increasing pressure on public transportation such as private minibus and taxi drivers and extort a daily war tax fee (impuesto de guerra). The amount of this fee is dependent on the lucrativeness of the route and areas of the city where the bus or taxi operates. Drivers failing to pay up are beaten or killed. Exacerbating the problem is that passengers pay in cash and some suggest the switch to a cashless payment system with signs that the driver does not carry cash.

# RADICAL ISLAMIC GROUPS IN SOUTH AMERICA

In a recent interview in the Ecuadorian magazine VISTAZO, Ilan Berman, Vice President of the American Foreign Policy Council in Washington, D.C., indicated that Ecuador is attractive to extremists and referred to a 2011 study on Hezbollah in Latin America which highlighted that at that time 80 Hezbollah activists were present in 12 Latin American countries, including in Ecuador.

Activities of Islamic extremists have shifted somewhat from the Tri-Country Region of Brazil, Argentina and Paraguay to the Venezuelan Margarita Island, where the political climate was more favorable under the now deceased president Hugo Chavez. Among these groups are representatives of the Iranian Quds Force, who are both in Venezuela and Bolivia.



#### **DEATH TO THE DICTATOR**

This extraordinary personal account of the clearly fraudulent re-election of Iranian president Mahmoud Ahmadinejad should be a "must read" for anyone desiring greater insight into the current Iranian regime and its suppression of opposing viewpoints and political candidates. The author of this book wrote under a pseudonym for fear of retaliation by the Iranian government. He provided a detailed

account of the events surround the 2008 election in Iran and the brutality of the regime which persecuted, incarcerated and/or killed those who opposed it, including Mir Hossein Mousavi, the opposition candidate. While hundreds of thousands hoped for a change, goon squads and uniformed security units attacked and hunted down those who dared to speak in favor of Mousavi.

After reading this book, an interesting question came to mind:

How would this suppression have ended if the people of Iran had the right to bear arms?



#### **UNIVERSAL TRANSLATOR**

If you have watched any of the Star Trek series you will likely be familiar with the "universal translator" used by the crew. With modern technology and a smart phone, you can download an "app" that is close to a universal translator. It is not perfect, as I have found during multiple tests using English, German, Japanese, Spanish and French, but for basic words or even short sentences, this Google Translator (app) will do the trick. Especially if you are in law enforcement or some type of public security/safety, or any other occupation with public contact, this app can reduce misunderstanding when dealing with persons not familiar with the English language.

There are multiple ways to use this app. Below is a screen shot of the app as it appears on my smart phone (android).



The screenshot above shows the language to translate from (left) and the language to translate to (right) The sentence is typed at the bottom of the screen next to the X. The results are both in Japanese characters and in Romaji, which shows how it would be pronounced using English letters. The loudspeaker logo can also be selected and a Google voice will speak out the translation results so it can be played to someone speaking that language.

Their response can in turn be recorded through the microphone and then translated back to English. The translations can also be saved.

#### **GOOGLE TRANSLATOR APP...**

The words to be translated can be spoken into the microphone, typed onto the screen, or you can even take a photo of the foreign words and it will translate them.

NOTE: The screen shot shows prompts in German but Google Translate can be set to any language format.



Above is a translation of "what is your name" from English to Arabic: The Arabic writing can also be enlarged on the android screen to make it more readable:



If you have Internet access, either via a computer or smart phone/tablet, you can watch (for free) a riveting 20 episode series about a Cyber Crime team of the Korean National Police Authority (KNPA) in streaming video. You can access the video

To find the series, use the app's or website's search option and type in "ghost". This will lead to the logo for the cyber crime drama and a list of all 20 episodes, each about 1 hour 3 minutes in length.

While the dramas are fiction, some of the cyber crime cases depict what actually ocurs in the real world. All dramas are subtitled in English and a host of other languages.
